Jack Holtwick (above) had a ball riding and showing it to us.



COULD WE IMAGINE - 60 PLUS ATTEND


Up to now, we had beautiful motors fined up at least a half block long, but nen something happened that we really didn't expect . . .

What did CAILLE Have to say About Their Motors in 1928?

By Jerry Ahrens The Antique Outboarder July, 1990

"Whenever the hum of outboard motors hangs upon the air, spelling to listening ears the zest and thrill speeding craft across the waters, you will find Caille, and you will find Caille out ahead. Years of experience in the design and construction of outboard motors, the finest equipment the world affords for manufacture, a personnel of skilled mechanics, these you will find at the Caille plant. They are the factors responsible for Caille supremacy, the factors that make the name Caille on an outboard motor equivalent of "sterling" on silver. You must drive a Caille to know the differnce."

This is what Caille had to say about their motors for 1928. Indeed, Caille was very proud of their motors, and one can tell when you study any Caille, the craftsmanship of the Caille engineers. I believe Caille was a very quality crafted outboard motor for its day,

one of which was the Caille model 30 racer, which will be the subject of this special interest report: The Caille model 30 racer was indeed a unique engine, as it was designed for service or racing. Caille rated its horsepower at 10, and also claimed it had a speed of up to 33 m.p.h. on racing hulls. The model 30 racer came with two props, one three blade for general service, and a two blade for high speeds or racing. If the operator were racing with this motor, he could then open the air intake valves, which resulted in mproved engine breathing. This would give a little more power which made this motor a good choice for racing.

Another feature on this motor was the option of installing the spark plugs in the end of the cylinders (for racing) instead of the top of the cylinders which was for service. Extra plugs were provided to seal off the other holes.

This Caille had priming cups on the cylinders which facilitated easier cold weather starting. The power head was stationary. Caille claimed this would greatly reduce vibration, which probably was a good sales pitch for 1928.

Caille also bragged on their power head and said the model 30 had oversized bearings, enlarged exhaust manifolds and a larger intake area to all add up to better performance.

The Caille model 30 was indeed a good looking motor with an all polished lower unit, polished fly wheel and gas tank. The decals on this engine consisted of one large decal on the back of the tank with the letters CAILLE. On each side were the start and oiling instructions, the starting on the left and the oil on the right, facing engine. On the front of the tank were two more decals which read "Made in Detroit, USA" on the left, and "Caille racer model 30" on the right.

The ad for 1928 reads:

The 1928 New Caille
Racer offers you the
maximum outboard motor
value. On actual brake test
it develops over 10 H.P.,
giving boats in racing trim
speeds up to 33 miles per
hour. Speed fans will thus
find that the "Racer" fulfills
their fondest dreams. In
every respect Caille design

has anticipated the needs of the speed enthusiast, and has also provided for general utility.

You can make no error in deciding to buy a Caille, for forethought and experience have eliminated every possible source of trouble. You win carefree hours for yourself when you choose the dependable Caille, the motor that has the basic factors of power, endurance and speed engineered into its design.

The Caille model 30 racer is indeed a handsome and very collectable old outboard motor. So, keep your eyes open, you never know, you just might happen on to one.
